

GATHERING

Acknowledgement of Country Please remain seated.

The clapping sticks sound at the door of the church and continue to sound as they are processed through the church to the front. The clapping sticks fall silent and the person playing them moves aside.

Once silence has fallen students 1 and 2 move to the lectern.

Introducing Cambodia

Student 1: Welcome to our liturgy for World Mission Month. Our focus country is Cambodia, where the Church seeks to provide shelter, food, education, and life fulfilling opportunities for children in need, especially those with disabilities. As we will learn, the cross featured in the artwork is worn by Bishop Kike and represents Jesus as an amputee. This reminds us that when we stand in solidarity with children with disabilities we stand in solidarity with Christ.

Let us prepare a focus space.

Student 2: Cambodia is a country of great beauty, with forests, lakes and ancient temples. Yet 37 per cent of people live in extreme poverty. We place an empty food bowl.

An empty food bowl is placed on the focus space.

Student 1: Although Cambodia is full of rich ancient tradition and culture, its recent history is quite dark. During a period of civil war over three million land mines were buried across the country.

A landmine warning sign is placed on the focus space.

Student 2: In Cambodia some children have fallen victim to a disease called polio and they are unable to walk.

We place a teardrop.



A large photo of a teardrop is placed on the focus space.

Student 1: In urban areas of Cambodia children are at risk from water contaminated by human waste.

A glass container of filthy water is placed on the focus space.

Student 2: In the Gospel of St John, Jesus says, "I have come that they may have life, life in all its fullness."

A lit candle is placed on the focus space.

Student 1: That we may be informed of the good work of the Church in Cambodia, let us watch a video presentation prepared by Catholic Mission.

The Catholic Mission video is played.

Student 2: Please stand for our gathering hymn.

Bishop Kike's photo is displayed on the PowerPoint.

Voice of Bishop Kike: (pronounced kee-kay)

My name is Bishop Kike.

I am from Spain, but now I work to help disabled children in Cambodia.

I am called the "Bishop of the Wheelchairs."

I have founded the Arrupe (ar-roo-pay) Centre, a place which allows children maimed by land mines to go to school.

And we also make and distribute wheelchairs for children with disabilities.

Cantor: Lord Jesus, you are hope for all.

You take away our sins.

Christ, have mercy.

All sing: Christ, have mercy.

Dara's photo is displayed on the PowerPoint.

Voice of Dara:

My name is Dara.

A few years ago I was walking around my parents' farm. I saw something made of metal sticking up through the ground.

I didn't know what it was.

I picked it up and began playing with it.

When I tapped it against a log it exploded.

The shrapnel took away my hand.

It also flew into my eyes leaving me unable to see

properly.

Cantor: Lord Jesus, you are strength for all. Your word is truth and

light.

Lord, have mercy.

All sing: Lord, have mercy.

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Slight pause

Presider: May almighty God cleanse us of our sins,

and through the celebration of this Eucharist

make us worthy to share at the table of his Kingdom.

All: Amen.

Slight pause before proceeding.

The proclamation of the Gospel is accompanied by a dramatic presentation. The Minister proclaims the narrator's part from the Ambo.

Minister: The Lord be with you.

Minister: One day when Jesus was teaching, some Pharisees and

teachers of the law were sitting there who had come from

every town in Galilee and Judea and Jerusalem.

The power of the Lord was present for Jesus to heal the sick. Some men came carrying a paralysed man on a bed, and they tried to take him into the house and put him in front of Jesus. Because of the crowd, however, they could find no

way to take him in.

So they carried him up on the roof, made an opening in the tiles, and let him down on his bed into the middle of the

group in front of Jesus.

When Jesus saw how much faith they had he said to the

man:

Jesus: Your sins are forgiven, my friend.

Minister: The teachers of the Law and the Pharisees began to say to

themselves:

Teacher of the Law: Who is this man who speaks such blasphemy?

Pharisee: God is the only one who can forgive sins.

Minister: Jesus knew their thoughts and said to them:

Jesus: Why do you think such things? I will prove to you that the Son

of Man has authority to on earth to forgive sins.

Minister: So he said to the paralysed man:

Jesus: I tell you, get up, pick up your bed, and go home!

Minister: At once the man got up in front of them all, took the bed he

had been lying on, and went home, praising God. They were

all completely amazed! Full of fear, they praised God:

ALL: What wonderful things we have seen today!

Minister: The Gospel of the Lord

Homily Please be seated.

Homily thoughts: The Gospel story connects with Catholic Mission's focus in Cambodia because both narratives concern themselves with the spiritual and physical well being of persons with disabilities. The Arrupe Centre caters to the needs of children who have physical and intellectual disabilities.

They are given skills and opportunities that allow them to lead full and meaningful lives.

At the Arrupe Centre the children find happiness and love. Children who attend the Arrupe Centre are given individual development plans to help them integrate into Cambodian society. They are given therapies that help them gain control of their limbs. And if they have lost limbs because of landmines... they are given a wheelchair.

In this sense, the "Body of Christ", broken on the cross, is being remembered through the good work of the Arrupe Centre.

Bishop Kike wears around his neck a pectoral cross that features Jesus as an amputee to remind us that when we stand in solidarity with children with disabilities we stand in solidarity with Christ. In Catholic Mission's video Bishop Kike says, "We are in God's arms, we are God's heart, we are the body of Christ in the world."

Universal Prayer Please stand.

of the Church and the world. We pray for change: in ourselves and in the circumstances of those in need,

particularly in Cambodia.

Reader: For missionaries, that they will accompany, with compassion,

those whose lives have been wounded.

Presider asks the Assembly to sit.

The following ritual takes place in silence once all are seated.

Two students come forward from either side. The first takes the empty bowl from the focus space. The second replaces it with a bowl filled fruit and/or rice. They then move to stand together in the centre aisle holding the empty bowl, ready to process out.



Two more students come forward from each side. The first student takes away the land mine warning sign. The second student replaces it with a laminated photo of a wheelchair. They then move to stand together in the centre aisle, ready to process out.

Two more students come forward from each side. The first student takes away the picture of the container of filthy water. The second student replaces it with a container of clear water. They then move to stand together in the centre aisle, ready to process out

Two more students come forward from each side. The first student takes away the laminated picture of a teardrop. The second student replaces it with a picture of a Cambodian girl in a wheelchair. They then move to stand together in the centre aisle, ready to process out.

Presider: God of all people, fill our hearts with your Holy Spirit that we will act justly to rid our world of all that harms our brothers and sisters. We ask this through Christ our Lord.

All: Amen.

The Presider, concelebrant and the assembly remain standing until the procession is at the back of the church.

The gifts and bread and wine are brought forward. Song for the presentation of the Gifts is sung.

Taking the chalice and holding it slightly above the altar, Presider says inaudibly:

Presider: Blessed are you, Lord God of all creation,

for through your goodness we have received the wine we

offer you:

fruit of the vine and work of human hands.

it will become our spiritual drink.

Then he places the chalice on the corporal.

Presider bows and says inaudibly:

Presider: With humble spirit and contrite heart

may we be accepted by you, O Lord,

and may our sacrifice in your sight this day

be pleasing to you, Lord God.

Presider washes his hands, saying inaudibly:

Presider: Wash me, O Lord, from my iniquity

and cleanse me from my sin.

He joins his hands and makes the Sign of the Cross once over the bread and chalice together, saying:

the body ** and blood of Jesus your Son.

He joins his hands.

Then we can offer to you what you have given for us.

On the night before he died, Jesus was having supper with his Apostles.

He takes the bread and, holding it slightly raised above the altar, continues:

He took bread from the table.

He gave you thanks and praise.

Then he broke the bread, gave it to his friends and said:

He bows slightly.

TAKE THIS, ALL OF YOU AND EAT OF IT: FOR THIS IS MY BODY WHICH WILL BE GIVEN UP FOR YOU.

He shows the consecrated host to the people, places it again on the paten, and genuflects in adoration.

After this, he continues:

When supper was ended,

He takes the chalice and, holding it slightly raised above the altar, continues:

Jesus took the cup that was filled with wine. He thanked you, gave it to his friends and said:

TAKE THIS, ALL OF YOU, AND DRINK FROM IT:
THIS IS THE CUP OF MY BLOOD,
THE BLOOD OF THE NEW AND ETERNAL COVENANT,
WHICH WILL BE POURED OUT FOR YOU AND FOR MANY
FOR THE FORGIVENESS OF SINS.



Then he said to them:

DO THIS IN MEMORY OF ME.He shows the chalice to the people, places it on the corporal, and genuflects in adoration.

Then, with hands extended, the Priest says: We do now what Jesus told us to do.

We remember his death and his resurrection and we offer you, Father, the bread that gives us life, and the cup that saves us.

Jesus brings us to you;

Welcome us as you welcome him.

Let us proclaim our faith:

All sing: When we eat this bread and drink this cup
We proclaim your death O Lord,
Until you come again.

Then Priest, with hands extended, says:

Father.

because you love us, you invite us to come to your table. Fill us with the joy of the Holy Spirit as we receive the body and blood of your Son.

Lord,

you never forget any of your children. We ask you to take care of those we love, especially of N. and N., and we pray for those who have died.

Remember everyone who is suffering from pain or sorrow. Remember Christians everywhere and all other people in the world.



We are filled with wonder and praise when we see what you do for us through Jesus your Son, and so we give you praise.

Through him, and with him, and in him, O God almighty Father, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all glory and honour is yours, almighty Father, for ever, and ever.

Presider: At the Saviour's command

and formed by divine teaching,

The presider joins his hands, and the people conclude the prayer, saying:

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The presider, with hands joined, continues inaudibly:

Presider: May the receiving of your Body and Blood,

The presider genuflects, takes the host and, holding it slightly raised above the paten or above the chalice, while facing the people, says aloud:

that you should enter under my roof,

but only say the word

and my soul shall be healed.

The Priest, facing the altar, says quietly:
