Advocacy

Engaging in advocacy is a way of acting for justice and participating in the transformation of the world, to bring about peace and justice for the entire planet. Jesus referred to this as bringing the 'reign of God'. The principles of our Catholic Social Teaching call us to not only take care of those in need but to also address the unjust social and economic structures and systems that put people in that situation.

This year as students learn about children with disability in Cambodia, we encourage them to take action and advocate against landmines, which is a common cause of disability in the country. Through their stories we **see** the direct connection to issues concerning ecological justice, human and child rights. By understanding that all people have a unique dignity and worth, we can **reflect** on our own sense of Mission and purpose and uphold the dignity of every child, including those with a mental or physical disability. In this way, students can put their faith into **act**ion, to facilitate and promote self-reliance and the active participation of all children in the community. Your students can:

- Speak to their family about what they've learnt.
- Research an issue and make a presentation to the class, year group or school assembly.
- Challenge stereotypes when they hear them in the playground, in class or at home.
- Use Social Media to highlight what's happening in Australia and overseas. Make sure to focus on the solutions as well as the challenges of poverty, healthcare, education.
- Connect with their local group of the Young Catholic Students (YCS) movement and think about starting or joining this movement.

Cambodia

This year, students across Australia are encouraged to learn about Cambodia, and through fundraising, prayer and advocacy, be a part of the life-changing work of the Church as they support children with disability.

Distressingly, in Cambodia, people with disability are not always accepted and given equal opportunity. Children with disability are sometimes not able to go to school and gain an education, and their families may struggle to care for them.

The Arrupe Centre, established by Bishop Enrique 'Kike' Figaredo Alvargonzalez in 2001, is a home for children with disability, providing them with support and opportunities to live a fulfilling life.

As Bishop Kike says, "We are here for the common good; to be a more inclusive society and to bring also the joy of life everywhere ... we look with a positive vision and, I would say, with hope and joy and happiness".

The Arrupe Centre strives to show the love of God through caring for and empowering those in need.

HAVE YOUR STUDENTS...



Ask classmates to share their favourite family recipes to make into a **class cookbook**. Simply print and make copies to sell to family, friends and neighbours. You can even ask for recipes for Cambodia or Southeast Asia.

Host a **family game night**, encouraging relatives or neighbours to bring their favourite board games, asking for a small contribution per family to play.

Host a virtual 'Rock your socks off' dance party with classmates with a gold coin contribution. You can even ask your family, friends and neighbours to sponsor you for \$5 for every hour you dance!

Collect clothes to donate to a charity. For each item of clothing, ask your parents or family for a donation.

Hold an **online movie day** with your family, watching a movie that focuses on issues such as supporting vulnerable children. Follow the movie with a short conversation about what you learned and ask for donations.

Research Cambodia and sell tickets to a **virtual trivia event** for classmates, friends and family.
